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


CRIMINOLOGY TIM NEWBURN ROUTLEDGE, 2013 (ONE COPY)




PRINCIPLES OF CONFLICT OF LAWS ABLA MAYSS CAVENDISH PUBLISHING, 1999 (ONE COPY)

The book provides students with a comprehensive overview of the conflict of laws rules as they apply in English law. The book then covers fully the recognition and enforcement of foreign judgements and explores the choice of law rules in respect of contract, tort, movable and immovable property and succession. Even lawyers who obey the law often seem to act unethically. Standard arguments within legal ethics attempt to show why it is permissible to do something as a lawyer that it would be wrong to do as an ordinary person. But in the view of most critics these arguments fail to turn wrongs into rights. In *Lawyers and Fidelity to Law*, Bradley Wendel proposes an ethics grounded on the political value of law as a collective achievement that settles intrastable conflicts, allowing people who disagree profoundly to live together in a peaceful, stable society. Lawyers must be loyal and competent client representatives, but these obligations must always be exercised within the law that constitutes their own roles and duties upon their clients.




What do Prince Charles, Bette Davis, Sir Ian Botham, Mrs Victoria Gillick and a man whose family grave appeared in the background of a splatter horror film have in common? Each of them felt they had been wronged in some way, and each went to court to try and do something about it. Sometimes their case was a purely private argument. Others brought cases of national importance, or claims which raised acute moral and ethical principles. Some won handsomely, while others lost so badly that they ended up far worse than when they started. This book looks at fifty legal disputes from Victorian times to present day, where compelling moral or legal issue was at stake, or where the background to the case was interesting, amusing or infuriating. The book is of interest not simply to lawyers but to anyone interested in stories of great human interest and how the legal system tried to deal with them.
